

ENGAGING GIRLS ON CLIMATE CHANGE IN MADAGASCAR









Funding: US\$500,000 to UNICEF USA




41% of the Madagascan population has access to basic water services; 17% to basic sanitation services and 23% to basic hygiene services. 81% of schools lack safe water and 31% lack basic latrines.

Goal: Support girls and a generation of children and adolescents by providing environmental education in Madagascar through child-friendly schools.

Approximately 119,000 students (including 66,000 girls) will directly benefit, and 1,500 teachers at 700 primary schools will indirectly benefit from school health and environmental action plans.

The most vulnerable populations are still the first victims of climate change in Madagascar.

Two weeks after cyclone Freddy swept the island from southeast to southwest, people affected by the disaster continue to live in unsafe conditions caused by rising waters in their neighborhood.





Engaging Girls on Climate Change in Madagascar

Deforestation has impacted approximately **94%** of Madagascar's previously forested lands. Almost **40%** of forest cover disappeared between the 1950s and 2000, including the reduction of almost **80%** of Madagascar's "core forest."

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- At least 540 girls and 1,500 teachers will be trained on water conservation, environmental education and menstrual health and hygiene.
- Five pilot schools will promote environmental education and reinforce hygiene and sanitation behaviors that promote children's access to education through gardens managed by child clubs under the supervision of schoolteachers. Community members will be educated about the impacts of climate change through trained healthcare workers, teachers, parents and students.
- At least **750 teachers at 700 primary schools** will receive training on climate and environment, sanitation and hygiene practices, clean school environment and the development of disaster risk plans to enable learning to continue during natural disasters.





ENGAGING GIRLS ON CLIMATE CHANGE IN MADAGASCAR – RESULTS TO DATE



5 pilot schools are working to improve their WASH programs, including menstrual health and hygiene.



750 teachers are being trained to create disaster risk plans that will enable learning to continue during natural disasters.



1,315 girls, received WASH education, including menstrual health and hygiene, which is embedded into students' Life and Earth Sciences curriculum.

ADOLESCENT GIRLS' HEALTH AND PROTECTION IN PERU









Funding: US\$750,000 to UNICEF USA



In 2020, national coverage of comprehensive health care for adolescents dropped by 63% compared to 2019. National coverage of adolescents who received mental health care fell by 50%.

Goal: Improve the capacity of services to respond to the health needs of adolescents, in particular adolescent girls, in a timely manner and prevent all forms of violence in schools and other services.

The project is expected to reach 50,364 adolescents (24,829 girls) in four regions throughout Peru.

ADOLESCENT GIRLS' HEALTH AND PROTECTION IN PERU - RESULTS TO DATE



49 health centers in Ucayali and Huancavelica have tools to collaborate with schools to protect students' mental health.



15 schools in target regions and 2,184 nationwide are implementing violence prevention protocols and a toolbox to implement health promotion actions.



76, 300 girls in the target regions benefit from the violence prevention strategy (PREVI) in schools.






The capacity of GBV service providers was strengthened through capacity building interventions in Milne Bay and Bougainville.




Health care providers in Milne Bay and Bougainville were trained on how to provide support to GBV survivors.











Globally, 21% of girls are married while they are still children, robbing them of their childhood.






GLOBAL PROGRAMME TO END CHILD MARRIAGE

- In the last decade, about 25 million child marriages have been prevented.
- Due to COVID-19, an additional **10 million girls** are at risk of becoming child brides by 2030.
- The COVID-19 pandemic increased risk for child marriages by interrupting education, creating food and economic insecurity, disrupting programs and services, increasing adolescent pregnancy, and causing deaths of parents and caregivers.





GLOBAL PROGRAMME TO END CHILD MARRIAGE - RESULTS TO DATE



2.6 million adolescent girls received life skills and comprehensive sexuality education.



16 million community members were reached with community dialogues on ending child marriage.



11 of the 12 countries have national strategies addressing child marriage, out of which six are budgeted and implemented.

CHANGES TO EDUCATION PROGRAMS

AE Fellowship

- 30 fellowships will be awarded each year instead of 35.
- Two fellowships per year will be funded by the AE Fellowship Endowment Fund.

JMK Women in Business Scholarship

- All district scholars who qualify will win the international scholarship in the amount of US\$5,000.
- The five districts with the most members will select two scholars.

YWPA Award

- All district awardees who qualify will win the international award in the amount of US\$5,000.
- The five districts with the most members will select two awardees.

Women in STEM Scholarship

- Pilot extension approved by the convention body
- Name changed from Women in Technology
- All district scholars who qualify will win the international scholarship in the amount of US\$5,000.
- One award cycle





THE IMPACT OF YOUR SUPPORT MADAGASCAR
